Under the reign of King Salman and his Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman (MBS), Saudi Arabia has executed 709 people, amongst whom are seven children. The Saudi regime uses the death penalty as a tool to terrorise its opposition. Since the beginning of this year, 110 people have been executed, including three minors.*

There are currently 46 people facing imminent execution after exhausting all formal appeals. Among them are three minors: Ali al-Nimr, Dawood al-Marhoun and Abdullah al-Zaher.*

Despite public outrage and criticism of the use of the death penalty, the public prosecution continues to demand the execution of children, scholars and activists, such as Salman al-Odah, Awad al-Qarni, Ali al-Omari, and Murtaja Qureiris, who is accused for acts committed when he was 10 years old.

It is reported all executed persons were subjected to brutal torture, such as electrocution and sexual harassment, to extract confessions.

The silence of the international community, including the US and the UK, is encouraging the Saudi regime to continue its policies of executions.

Courts that issued the death sentences do not meet the minimum international standards for fair trials.

Who is responsible for the loss of innocent lives?
